**To the Aylmer Police Services Board
and the citizens of Aylmer**

I have the honour of presenting my tenth annual report outlining the activities and services performed by the men and women of the Aylmer Police during 2004.

Our annual budget for **2004** was set at **\$1,439,280**. Even though we were under budget by **\$34,961** in operating expenses and **\$8,259** in capital expenses, we still experienced a deficit of **\$44,864**. This was primarily the result of an unexpected increase in overtime through the year due to labour shortages. The Police Services Board budget of **\$27,930** realized a deficit of **\$877**.

The Aylmer Police continues to build on our partnerships with several community organizations to provide support to our citizens that find themselves victims of crime or involved in the judicial system. The Aylmer Police has taken an active role in the implementation of a protocol for an *Elgin Coordinated Community Response To Abused Women And Their Children*.

We have hired a second temporary Special Constable to do Court officer duties while one of our Constables is off on a one year absence. We continue to benefit from our agreement with the O.P.P. and St. Thomas Police for prisoner transports. Our first Special Constable is also assisting with our training needs, utilizing his expertise as a former Ontario Police College instructor.

The Aylmer Police is still benefiting from the Community Partnership Program administered by the Ministry of Public Safety and Security, which is offsetting the cost of one Constable.

The Aylmer Police has partnered with the M.T.O. in an enforcement initiative, targeting unsafe commercial motor vehicles travelling through Aylmer. This initiative has greatly reduced

The Aylmer Police has completed the ninth year of our community-based *Adopt a School* program of making periodic visits to the schools in Aylmer. We continue to support community based policing, through our efforts of maintaining the goals and objectives, as set out in our Business plan. 2004 marked the start of our second three-year business plan. Goals and objectives were reassessed with the assistance of members of the public, the Aylmer Police Advisory Committee and the Aylmer Police Association. As a result, the Aylmer Police Service Boards 2004-2006 Business Plan was modified accordingly.

A special thank you to our other Ontario Police Service partners and the Ontario Police College for their assistance, in helping us reach our training needs. We continue to participate with the O.P.P. in Defensive Tactics and In-Service training, utilizing O.P.P. and our own training officers. This continues to assist us in meeting our training needs in the most economical manner.

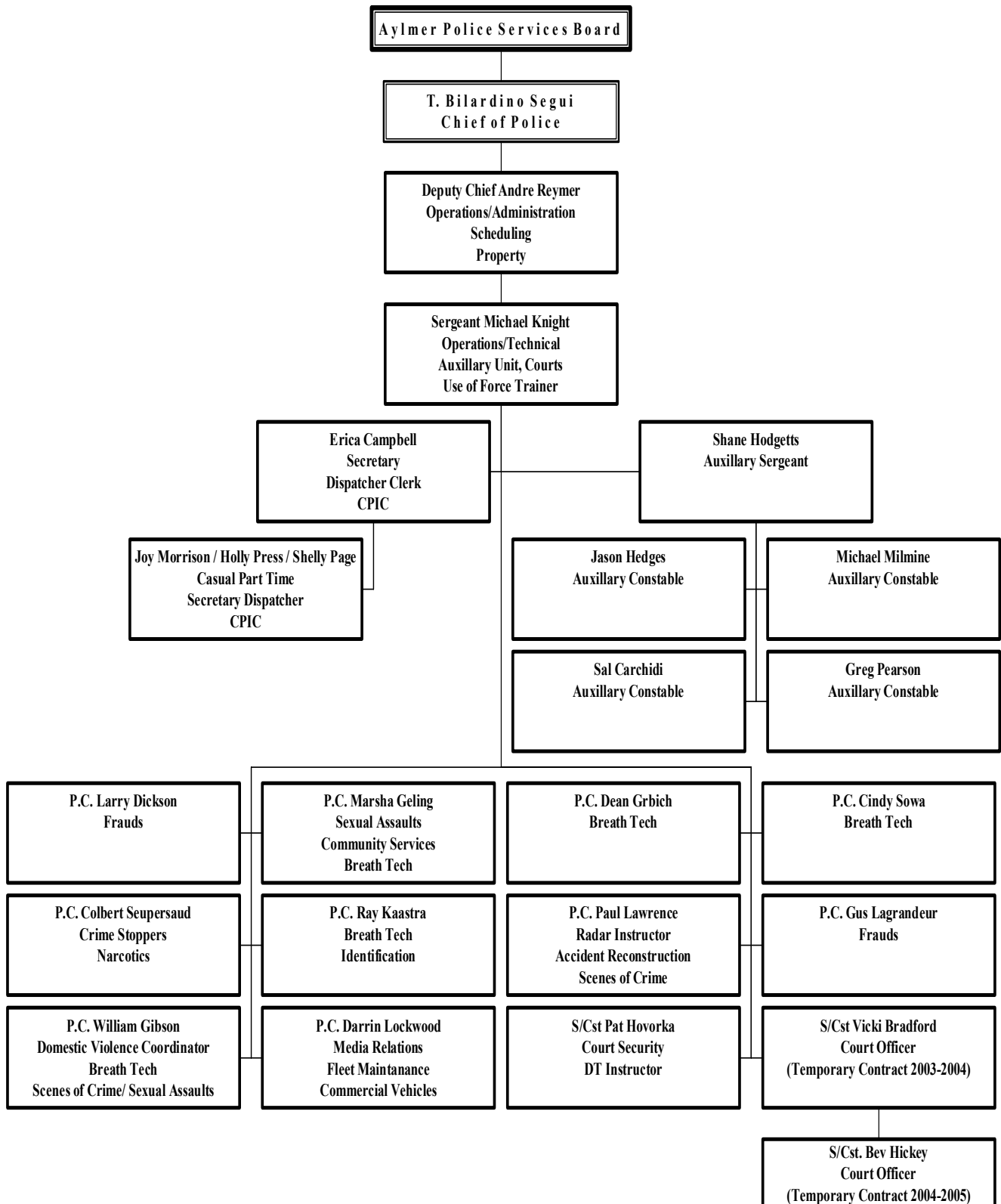

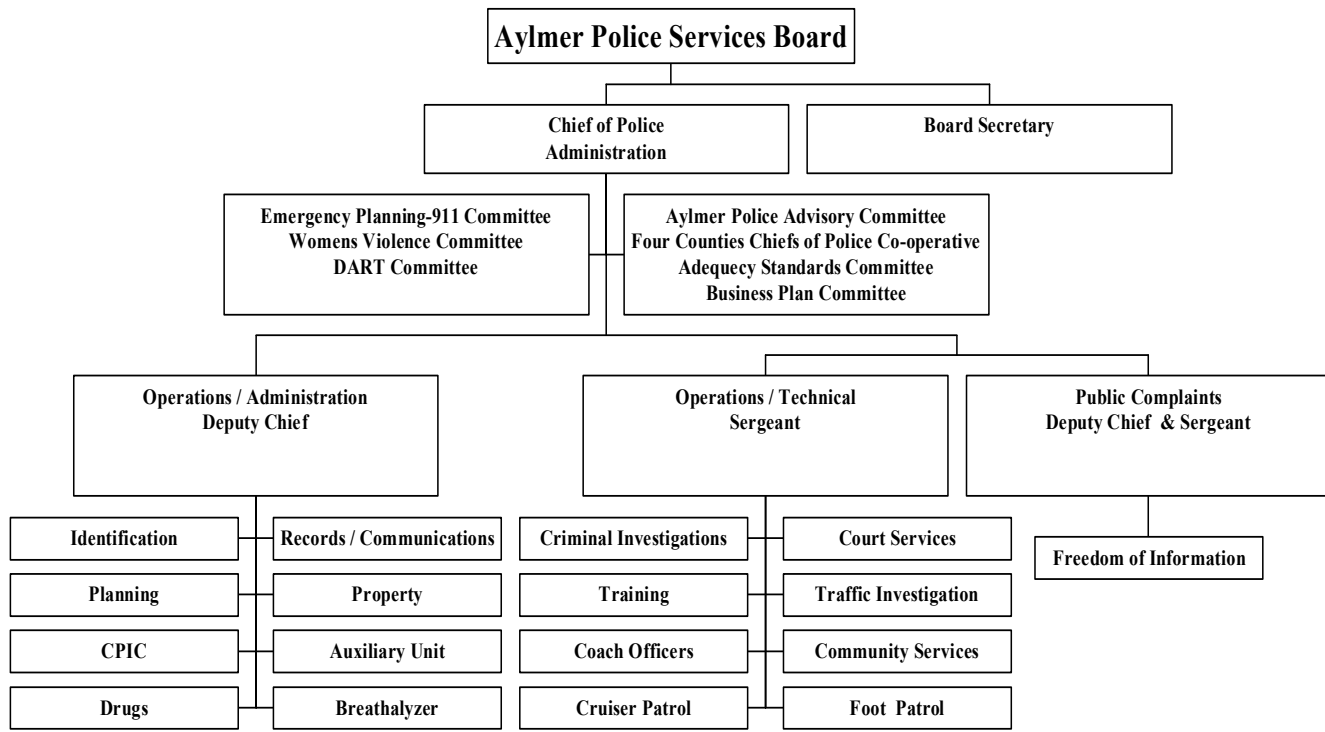

The transition to digital will continue into 2005 where it is anticipated that the majority of photographs will be taken and stored in the digital format. Photographic evidence is prepared for, and presented in Court from this digital format.

Municipal Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act (F.O.I.A.)

The *Municipal Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act* provides citizens with a right of access to records within the custody or control of all municipal public sector organizations, including Police Services. Access to these records is not absolute. There are certain mandatory and discretionary exemptions, which are applied. Details about the operation of the *Act* and interpretations of the 10 exemption provisions can be found at the Web site of the Office of the Information and Privacy Commissioner (the IPC) www.ipc.on.ca. The Aylmer Police routinely processes requests from the public for access to records either of a personal nature or information in general. Deputy Chief Andre Reymer and Sergeant Michael Knight are designated as FOIA officers.



In 2004 the Aylmer Police processed **10 requests for personal information and 2 for general records**. Partial exemptions and exclusions resulted in all 10 personal records being disclosed. One of the two general record requests were fully disclosed while the other was abandoned.


Aylmer Police Auxiliary Constable Program

The Auxiliary program continues to be an integral component of the Aylmer Police. Auxiliary members once again assisted in general patrol and parade duties thus augmenting staffing levels. Officers have received training in self-defence or defensive tactics, use of force, and officer safety programs. Members have in past years been invited to participate in firearms training. Auxiliary members are not issued firearms. The purpose of such type of training is to familiarize them with the knowledge, skills, and abilities to use these weapons should a need ever arise. Officers continue to increase their general knowledge of policing issues through use of the OPVTA police training tapes and CD's, which supplement standard training.

- Greg Pearson was hired in August to replace Tyler Avram who resigned from the Auxiliary unit in 2003 . Greg was then recruited by the London Police in December . The Aylmer Police wish to congratulate the Greg and wish him success.
- Sal Carchidi was hired in August as well and brought the Auxiliary Unit to it's full strength of five members.
- Shane Hodgetts, Jason Hedges, and Michael Milmine continue to serve in the unit.

The Auxiliary unit continues to prove to be an invaluable resource for the Aylmer Police. Replacement hiring of one positions is planned for mid 2005.

SUMMARY

The Aylmer Police have had a busy and productive year in 2004 in regards to community services and Crime Prevention. Presentations again were again offered to the schools, topics included bus safety, Block Parents and street safety, and Bullying, which has become quite prevalent. The Values Influences and Peers Program was also offered and taught to the grade 6 students. This program in itself is time consuming but a valuable tool to this age level as it offers them alternative in making decisions.

Constable Geling was again involved in a variety of committees including Road Safety Committee, Operation Impact Elgin, Please be Seated Elgin, Racing Against drugs and Davenport Healthy Schools Committee. Cst. Seupersaud was again involved with the Jail or Bail as well as Crimestoppers Bowl-a-Rama held in Aylmer at Cy's Lanes many person in the community had a fun filled time while assisting in promoting and raising money for this worthwhile cause.

The Aylmer Police work in cooperation with a number of organizations without these organizations some of the programs offered would not as valuable. Some of these include the Optimist Club Bike Rodeo, RCMP Racing Against Drugs, and the Elgin St. Thomas Health Unit to provide guidance and assistance to many of the events. Car Seat Clinics were also held and kept Cst. Geling busy with appointments for




the Aylmer Police would like to thank the people within the community for their continuing support and assistance.

COMMERCIAL MOTOR VEHICLE PROGRAM

2004 was the second year Aylmer Police Service had dedicated expertise and enforcement to the Commercial Motor Vehicle industry. Cst. Lockwood continues to be a certified member of the Commercial Vehicle Safety Alliance. The Alliance is represented by the Canadian Federal Transportation Ministry, Provincial Transportation Ministries, USA Federal Transportation Department, USA State Transportation Departments, Mexico and representation from the Commercial Motor Vehicle private industry across North America. The Alliance ensures standardized “Out-of-Service” criteria and inspection techniques are employed universally and consistently. Cst. Lockwood must complete a minimum of 30 Commercial Motor Vehicle Inspections per year, as well as attend numerous refresher and additional training programs to maintain the certification.

Cst. Lockwood is certified as a “Dangerous Goods Inspector” and a “Critical Defect Inspector” to which he remains one of three police officers dedicated as such in the Province. Further, Cst. Lockwood has completed certified training in Ontario Regulation 363 – “Security of Loads”, which takes effect January 1, 2005.

The Aylmer Police Service continues to join forces with the Ministry of Transportation, OPP Commercial Carrier Unit, Oxford Community Police Service, and Strathroy Police Service, in commercial motor vehicle enforcement across Elgin, Middlesex, Oxford and Norfolk Counties.
