Over the past few months, the Deputy Chief and the Aylmer Police Service Board, along with various interested parties have been diligently working on the Business Plan for the Aylmer Police Service. The Plan lays out the goals of the Service for the next three years.

We shall dedicate ourselves to providing a courteous and quality service that will be responsive to the needs of the community.


The Aylmer Police service is committed to professionalism and the service provided will be synonymous with excellence.

Local Government

Municipalities in the province of Ontario derive their existence from the Province and are subject to provincial legislation for jurisdiction to act, primarily The Municipal Act. The Town of Aylmer is located within the County of Elgin and participates in the County Government -- an upper tier of government where urban and rural municipalities share certain common responsibilities and services such as welfare, maintenance of a county roads system, a county health unit, senior citizens housing and services, a county library system and certain tourism and planning functions. Aylmer has a seven member municipal council consisting of a Mayor (head of council), a Deputy Mayor and five Councillors. The Mayor represents the Town on County Council.

Elgin County elects one representative to the Provincial Legislature in Toronto and one representative to the Canadian Federal Parliament in Ottawa.

Public education within Elgin County falls under the jurisdiction of the Thames Valley District school Board and the London District Catholic School Board. Two private schools are also in Aylmer: Immanuel Christian School and The Church of God.

Housing

Geography

The Town of Aylmer is favourably connected with the primary road network in Southwestern Ontario. Major transportation arteries serving the Town are Highway 3 and the former Highway 73. The latter provides access North about 20 km to Hwy. 401 which is a major four-lane divided highway extending from Windsor to the Ontario/Quebec border. As well, Hwy. 402 is a direct route from London to Sarnia

Industry

The Town of Aylmer has an industrial base. The largest industry is Imperial Leaf Tobacco. Tobacco is grown in the rural community surrounding Aylmer. Some of the other non-retail related employers which add to the local economy include Amtelecom, the Aylmer Express, ICS Couriers, the Ministry of Natural Resources, and the Thames Valley District School Board. In additional, many of Aylmer residents are employed in neighbouring cities such as London, St. Thomas, and Tillsonburg where the major focus of their industrial base is automotive related.

Community Survey

In 2000 the first community survey was contracted out to the University of Western Ontario and consisted of a telephone survey. In 2004 a similar written survey consisted of 1000 of them being distributed to Aylmer and area population to ensure certain groups be specifically covered. The portioning was adjusted to keep the greater majority of the respondents as actual Aylmer ratepayers. It was agreed the distribution be as follows:

•	Aylmer Residents	700
•	East Elgin Secondary	100

•	Aylmer seniors	50

The purpose of the surveys was to solicit community opinion of the Aylmer Police services provided to them. The 2004 survey was gauged against the previous 2000 survey results. Then 1247 households were contacted and 311 people completed the survey for a 24% response rate. In 2004 we received 252 responses from 1000 surveys for a 25% response rate. The responses were received and tabulated by the planning committee.

The demographic of respondents were 75% Aylmer residents, 60% being female with the largest age groups being 35-44 and 65 & over. 42% had post secondary education with 90% being homeowners.

Few problems stood out as issues in Aylmer with the majority of the respondents making them as "somewhat" of a problem (3 out of 5). An equal number surveyed stated "I don't know". Public opinion was highest on our ability to enforce laws and treating people fairly. The respondents did score the police lower in their ability to prevent crime. Services



and programs cited as important included R.I.D.E, Victim Services, and Community Policing.

Objectives of the Aylmer Police

- 1. To serve and protect the community;
- 2. To provide a safe environment for persons both in their homes and public places;
- 3. To ensure citizens feel secure in their community.

Core Functions of Policing

The Aylmer Police provide the six services necessary to ensure the delivery of adequate and effective policing;

1) Crime Prevention; 2) Law Enforcement; 3) Victims Assistance; 4) Public Order Maintenance; 5) Emergency Response and 6) Administration & Infrastructure.

The six core services are provided directly to the community by members of the Aylmer Police. Functions are those services which will be provided to the community, either by direct means, or through contracting out, as provided for in the Adequacy Standards Regulation.

Police Coverage & Visibility

The Aylmer Police provide two police officers on patrol twenty-four hours per day, seven days per week. In order to accomplish this a compressed forty-eight hour work week of twelve hours shifts are utilized with one hour overlap start and finish times. Police officers work four day blocks of two day shifts and two night shifts with four days off afterwards. To ensure efficiency first days shifts and first night shifts are considered "call shifts". This officer would usually respond to calls for service from the public. Second dayshifts and night shifts are utilized for follow-up investigations from their first shifts, and community service work such as foot patrol, and school visits.

Officers are on general cruiser patrol in two of three marked Aylmer Police cruisers. Enforcing traffic laws and responding to traffic complaints are part of cruiser patrol. Beat duty may consist of downtown walking patrols, school walk throughs, or bicycle patrol. Officers aim to be visible to the public at all times through both types of patrols. Peak pedestrian and vehicle traffic times for work & school are monitored by cruiser patrols. Investigations, especially criminal, often require a great degree of time. Certain criminal offences require Police Services dispatch more than one officer respond as per legislation. Much of an investigation involves interviewing people, which usually occurs at the Police Station. Officers generally do much of their own data entry on computers situated at the police station. The end result is that an investigating officer spends a great deal of initial investigative time out of the public eye.

The introduction of the new *Youth Criminal Justice Act* replaced the *Young Offenders Act* in 2003. Philosophically the Act seeks to rehabilitate youth offenders by diverting them from the court system. Police officers are now formally tasked with creating, referring, and

monitoring programs for offenders. The probation tasks are now also on the shoulders of the police. Better police & youth interaction is a benefit, but it comes with the cost of a greater time commitment.

Witnesses are interviewed when they are available, not when the officer is. Again this is also generally day time hours. Aylmer residents can be assured that their neighbourhoods are patrolled as they sleep. The end result is that the public may often be left with the impression that during waking hours they do not see police officers actively on the street. The Aylmer Police strive to keep a balance of day to night patrols, however, when an emergency arises the first 24 hours are often crucial for an investigative commitment.

Budget Forecast

A Business Plan is prepared by the Aylmer Police Services Board once every three years. The plan will include a yearly budget comprising of;

- Operational (supplies, maintenance, uniforms, etc)
- Non-operational (salaries & benefits)
- Capital (cruiser, & other one time purchases)

The budget is a forecast for a future based on known and anticipated costs and circumstances.

Note: this is a forecast only and is not the actual budget. An annual budget will be presented in the beginning of each year reflecting known factors for that year.

Performance Indicators:




The Violent Crime rate has dropped by more than 50% in the last four years and the clearance rate has increased 20%. It is believed high clearance rates coincide with lower occurrence rates. Domestic Assaults and Robberies are captured in this data.

Property Crime

Objective: Increase clearance Rates for property offences through property identification programs and promoting prompt reporting by victims.

Performance Indicators:



Many property offences go unsolved largely due to the complainant's inability to identify their property. Promoting the cataloguing of serial numbers and offering programs to assist the community will assist in investigations and prompt return to owners.

Youth Crime

Objective: Reduce incidents of Youth Crime by;

- maintaining school contacts as stated in Community Patrol and the utilization of innovative diversion methods and extra judicial measures.
- Maintain exposure to youth through open street interaction and participation in youth programs and events.
- Encourage the Crime Stoppers program within East Elgin Secondary school.

Performance Indicators:

Tracking clearance rates by youths charged and the increasing number who are diverted through the Youth Criminal Justice Act.



The offence rates are decreasing and repeat offences will be tracked through RMS & victim service groups.



Information Technology

Current Status

The Aylmer Police are stakeholders in OPTIC (Ontario Police Technology Information Co-operative). We have evolved into two joined systems CAD/RMS (Computer Aided Dispatch/Records Management System). The Aylmer Police also have a CPIC terminal (Canadian Police Information Centre) which allows the Aylmer Police access and maintenance to Federal and provincial databases which include the RCMP criminal records and the Ministry of Transportation licence database. A Firewall system was implemented in 2002 and 2003 utilizing a Provincial Technology Grant. Although connected to the Internet and Intranet the Aylmer Police remain protected internally. Photographic evidence is digitally stored and made available through an in house server. OPTIC is currently costing a digital mug shot system and the Aylmer Police could participate with current procedures in place. The Aylmer Police installed a video interview and surveillance system within the police building in 2001.

Objectives:

- 1. Website for the Aylmer Police
- 2. Witness Video room
- 3. Portable computer and projector
- A website would allow for pubic awareness and access to on-going police concerns and announcements. Linking it to the Town of Aylmer would enhance the public profile of our community for present and future residents and investors. Creation of the site could be contracted out or requested to be a project/contest for our secondary school students. Hosting would be external for security reasons.
- A separate video taped "soft" interview room for witnesses and victims is more suitable than using the "hard" interview room in the detention area in proximity to prisoners. The second room could also double as a back-up system in case the primary failed. A room for this purpose is already in place. The existing video system is capable of accepting additional equipment.
- A laptop computer makes data portable. Presentations in the courts and public will be more effective using the computer and projector with conventional software. A portable system can also be loaded with RMS and other police applications and also serve as a back-up in case of a primary system outage.

Resource Planning

Aylmer Police Administration will implement resource planning by quarterly meeting with the entire staff to discuss new issues and reinforce the business plan objectives and goals. The combination of manual tracking through officer reports and computer analysis through RMS will assist in the reporting. The annual budget will reflect the financial requirements while the year-end report will detail all current and planned training schedules. At monthly Police Service Board meetings the Chief of Police will issue a report which includes crime trends, provincial and criminal charges, call analysis, human resource statistics, police pursuits, and public complaints. This report provides a year to date comparison and a report for the same month from the year prior. A budget comparison will also be reported on monthly.

The Chief of Police will prepare an annual year end report which will include workload assessments and service delivery evaluations for the following areas:

- a) crime prevention;
- b) law enforcement, including separate assessments and evaluations for the service's
 - i) community patrol,
 - ii) communications and dispatch,
 - iii) crime analysis,
 - iv) criminal intelligence,
 - v) criminal investigation and
 - vi) investigative supports functions;
- c) providing assistance to victims;
- d) public order maintenance; and
- e) emergency response services for the six functions identified in sections 21(1) and 22 of the Adequacy Standards Regulation.

Communication

The business plan will be communicated to the members of the Aylmer Police Service through its quarterly meetings. It will be made a part of the Policy & Procedure manual for the members and thereby always be available. Since this is a public document it will be presented to Aylmer Town Council during open session in June 2004. Annually the Chief and the Board will prepare an evaluation of the business plan to be presented to council. The public will be invited through the media to attend these presentations. Copies of the business plan and all subsequent evaluation reports shall be in document form and made available to the public. The Civilian Advisory Committee will continue to meet at their own discretion with the administration of the Aylmer police. The business plan was prepared in consultation with this group and will continually be evaluated through them. On going public input is essential to the efficient operation of the Aylmer Police.

Police Facilities

The Aylmer Police maintains our sole police facility located at 20 Beech St.E., Aylmer, Ontario. The building was constructed in 1997 and conforms to all legislative requirements. As legislation changes the Aylmer Police will conform accordingly. The Police Station is accessible to the public during normal working hours 9am to 5pm. From 5pm to 9am and on weekends and holidays the interior of the facility is closed to the public. There is, of course, 24 hour patrol policing with telephone availability in the lobby. The boardroom, when not in use for police purposes, is available to the public without charge. An average 40 groups per year use our community room.

A building committee consisting of Police Management, Police Association, and Police Services Board has been set to review current and future concerns;

- Short term issues include painting the cell block for easier cleaning of potential body fluids, and general interior paint job.
- A mid term project would be for a larger report room and records officer work area. This would require light construction and furniture replacement.
- Longer term goals include building enlargement and secure storage/parking.

The Police building is inspected by a joint health & safety committee as part of the WSIB (Workplace Safety & Insurance Board) requirements and the Aylmer Police Occupational Health & Safety Policy. The Chief of Police will review and report back to the board, at least once every business cycle, on whether the Aylmer Police meet or exceed all items listed in section 6 of the Board's Policy AI-001.




D2. What is the language most commonly spoken in this household?




D3. Into which of these age categories do you fall?



D4. Is the residence you live in owned or rented?




D5. What is your highest level of education you have completed?






D6. Which of the following categories best describes your household income in 2003, before taxes?

What would happen in an emergency We wait while the officer continues to drive his children home? We pay a lot of money in taxes for
- police service and I really wonder if we would be better served by O.P.P. given the slacking off observed almost daily.

 Control of the criminal element in any community is essential. Protecting society from those who would prey on it is a must if that society is to function in a normal healthy manner. As important is the resolution of conflicts that may occur within households or between neighbours before they escalate to the point at which they become a crime.
